REGULAR BUSINESS MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Chair Brennan called the meeting to order at 7:35 a.m. The Board then adjourned into executive session, the stated purposes of which were—to consider employment matters pursuant to 121.22(G)(1) and to consider real estate matters pursuant to 121.22(G)(2) of the Revised Code. The vote for approval was 8-0. Chair Brennan recused herself from participating in any discussion on two real estate matters and was absent from the executive session during those discussions. On a unanimous vote, the meeting returned to public session at 10:05 a.m.

REPORT OF THE CHAIR

Chair Brennan congratulated the Men's Soccer Team for winning the College Cup NCAA Division I National Championship and asked Secretary Mallo to develop a formal resolution for the team and Coach Caleb Porter to be presented at the next Board meeting. Chair Brennan also acknowledged the fall graduates as well as faculty, staff and Trustees who participated in commencement ceremonies on December 11. She then offered best wishes for the holidays to all.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT (See Appendix B)

REPORT OF THE STUDENT TRUSTEES

Student Trustee Rich offered his congratulations to the men's soccer team, noting what great representatives Coach Porter and all of the players are for UA, both on and off of the field. He said he had great fun watching them this season, making it to every game but one when he had class.

He thanked the Trustees for their excellent showing at commencement. He said that it is about the most important thing a Student Trustee does and that he has been to 17 ceremonies in two years.

He also reported on—new Student Trustee Katie Duff being on board for the January meeting; his desire to form a state-wide Student Trustee Organization; and the UA School of Law achieving the top Ohio Bar passage rate for first-time takers.

Student Trustee Rich then introduced the featured student, Melanie Doychak (See Appendix C) Ms. Doychak offered some remarks to the Board regarding her experiences at the University and was presented with a commemorative clock by Trustees.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE, FISCAL POLICY, AND INVESTMENT COMMITTEE
presented by Vice Chair Pogue using a consent agenda

1. Quarterly Report, July-September 2010 (Tab 1)

Accumulated summer and fall student revenues exceed the first-quarter projections by \$3.5 million as enrollment is up by 4 percent. The state has announced a planned withholding of 90 percent of its 12th payment, or \$7.2 million. That revenue shortfall will be overcome using the budget stabilization fund and vacancy savings dollars in excess of the planned \$3 million savings. Expenditures remain in line with budget projections.

REPORT OF THE AUDIT COMMITTEE presented by Committee Chair Pogue

1. External Audit Results, June 30, 2010 (Tab 1)

Mr. Pogue noted that the University, The University of Akron Foundation and the University of Akron Research Foundation received a clean opinion from the external auditors. He added that the committee had met at length with Nathan Mortimer and a representative of the external auditor.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL POLICY/STUDENT AFFAIRS COMMITTEE
presented by Committee Chair Bond, using a consent agenda

1. Report of the Provost INFORMATION ONLY (See Appendix D)

2. Presentation to the Board (Tab 2) INFORMATION ONLY

Dr. Hendrik Heinz, Assistant Professor of Polymer Engineering and a recent recipient of an NSF CAREER Award, discussed his work in biomineralization in collaboration with other research groups in the U.S. and in the U. K. Dr. Heinz's research is focused on the design of biomolecules for specific binding to inorganic surfaces and the understanding of biomineralization by molecular simulation. He was introduced by Dr. Stephen Z. D. Cheng, dean of the College of Polymer Science and Polymer Engineering.

3. Naming of the Newly Created Akron Functional Materials Center (Tab 3)

The Academic Policies Committee of the Faculty Senate has approved the request submitted by the faculty in the College of Polymer Science and Polymer Engineering to officially name the newly created Akron Functional Materials Center (AFMC). The AFMC will be a joint venture between the University and the Austen BioInnovation Institute, the latter of which has agreed to provide \$1.6 million over two years to launch this initiative. The AFMC will be a unique, national resource focused on elevating the technology readiness level of research discoveries and new polymeric materials. Its use will be open to faculty and students from throughout the University who are doing research in those areas, and it will attract numerous industrial organizations to interact and work with those researchers.

RESOLUTION 12-6-10 (See Appendix E)

4. Curriculum Recommendations (Tab 4)

AS-10-029: Five-year BA/MA in History

This proposal creates an accelerated five-year BA/MA program. Under the supervision of faculty advisors in history, a student in the program will finish the core course requirements and most of the electives for the bachelor's degree in the first three years. During the third year of the baccalaureate degree, a student will formally apply to the program through the Graduate School. Upon acceptance, a student will be cleared to complete the remaining electives of the bachelor's degree and 30 credits of graduate work for the master's degree in the last two years. After successfully completing this program, a student will receive both a bachelor's and a master's degree in history.

ED-06-06 B.S. in Postsecondary Technical Education Online

This proposal enables the College of Education to offer the B.S. in Postsecondary Technical Education online.

Faculty Senate approved these recommendations.

RESOLUTION 12-7-10 (See Appendix E)

5. Approval of the Graduation List and Statistics for Fall 2010 (Tab 5)

Candidates for a total of 1,453 degrees were deemed eligible to participate in the University's Fall 2010 Commencement ceremonies. Twenty doctoral, 29 Juris Doctor, 350 master's and 1,054 undergraduate degrees were conferred on December 11 and subsequently presented for ratification.

6. Research Grants and Sponsored Programs Report, October 2010 (Tab 6)

For July-October 2010, funding for externally funded research and other sponsored programs was \$13,511,053 million for 163 projects. For July-October 2009, funding was \$21,156,213

million for 188 projects. For July-October 2010, four patents were issued, nine patent applications were filed, and 24 disclosures were submitted. For July-October 2009, one patent was issued, 14 patent applications were filed, and 13 disclosures were submitted.

In the absence of Dr. Newkome, Dr. Sherman highlighted several additional items from the written report.

7. Information Technology Report (Tab 7) INFORMATION ONLY

Mr. Sage highlighted several items from the written report and offered to answer questions. He said that, in future meetings, he will report on—how the University is expanding its online course offerings to reach new markets, how mobile technologies such as smart phones and iPads will impact teaching and learning, and how the University is using advanced data warehousing and business intelligence tools to make more informed decisions. In response to a question from Judge Bond, Mr. Sage discussed development regarding electronic textbooks. He said he hopes mobile reader devices will evolve in the next six to 12 months to the point that the University may be able to provide students with such devices preloaded with their textbooks.

8. Student Affairs Report (Tab 8) INFORMATION ONLY

Dr. Fey highlighted several items and offered to answer questions.

9. Student Engagement Proposal (Tab 9) INFORMATION ONLY

Judge Bond gave Trustees copies of a memo from her, former Student Trustee Marcus Phelps and Director of Multicultural Development Fedearia Nicholson. The memo noted that each Board member received a Student Engagement Proposal following the presentation to the Board on April 28, 2010. In furtherance of that proposal, the memo offered the following action plan to facilitate outreach by individual members of the Board:

- Down the Career Path – Trustees, ideally two at a time, meet over the academic year with a wide variety of student groups, particularly those that link to our inclusive excellence values such as SAAB and SAAS, and informally relate personal life stories regarding education and career histories. Participate in an open discussion of the opportunities, connections and choices that shaped careers.
- Take a Student to Work Day – Take a student for a full- or half-day work experience with the Trustee's employer. This can be structured so that the student spends time with other individuals and learns about the business and the work culture of the employer. Explore possible internship or summer employment opportunities with the employer.
- Mentor a Student – Students are matched with Trustees throughout the spring semester for individual meetings, email contact, attendance at a cultural event, sharing a meal, discussion of career and life choices.
- Shadow a Student – Spend a half day with a student, attending classes, discussing courses, campus life, comparing undergraduate experiences.

Judge Bond asked that Trustees determine which items would be the best fit for them and to inform her of their individual choices so that connections can be established. She asked for responses before the next Board meeting.

REPORT OF THE EXTERNAL AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

1. Cumulative Gift and Grant Income Report, October 2010 (Tab 1)

For July 2010-October 2010, total giving of \$13.2 million, 2 percent less than the \$13.4 million received for the first four months of FY2010 and 28 percent more than the five-year average of \$10.2 million. The number of gifts increased, from 7,798 for July 2009-October 2009 to 8,237 gifts for this fiscal year to date.

REPORT OF THE FACILITIES PLANNING AND OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE

presented by Committee Chair Mohan

1. Capital Request Prioritization – Academic Facility Enhancement Initiative (Tab 1)

The University of Akron's strategic plan, Vision 2020, will be enhanced by prioritizing projects to efficiently create a vibrant and engaging campus environment (Goal 5), including appropriate combinations of new construction, renovation and infrastructure improvements through a process called the Academic Facility Enhancement Initiative (AFEI). Because requesting capital funding for specific individual projects risks missing opportunities for synergies and efficiencies through a more comprehensive university-level approach, the AFEI will help to determine necessary capital projects through 2020. Components of the AFEI include — continuing the objectives of the 1999 Campus Development Guide Plan; ascertaining and providing optimal amounts of appropriate types of spaces while also providing flexibility, efficiency and appropriately high space utilization; and reducing deferred maintenance significantly. For the FY2011-2012 biennium, the University has recommended a capital allocation of \$11.5 million to the AFEI. The exact allocation of state capital funding still is to be determined.

DISCUSSION: In response to questions from Board members regarding why no specific projects are provided and how state capital funds are determined, Mr. Curtis said that the AFEI would provide maximum flexibility to use whatever capital funds may be made available by the state using its standard formula. During a discussion among Trustees, Dr.

Proenza and Dr. Sherman said that the Board still would approve any specific projects undertaken with state capital funds, and those projects would be determined using a renewed campus master guide plan that is aligned with the academic plan. Dr. Sherman said that renewal process would be brought to the Board in the near future. Judge Bond said that the University must not become so flexible that it departs from the plan and simply reacts to whatever is on the table that day.

REPORT OF THE RULES COMMITTEE presented by Committee Chair York

1. Rule 3359-1-03, Committees of the Board (Tab 1)

The revision to this rule was proposed by the Board's Strategic Issues, Governance and Compliance Committee and its Chair, Trustee Pogue. It consists of changing that committee's name to Strategic Issues Committee.

DISCUSSION: Mr. Pogue asked Trustees to please respond to the questionnaire circulated by the committee.

RESOLUTION 12-12-10 (See Appendix E)

ACTION: Motion on behalf of committee passed 8-0.

NEW BUSINESS presented by Chair Brennan

1. Revision to Contract Professional Rules, 3359-22-01 and 3359-22-05 (Tab 1)

Under this rule change, most contract professionals will benefit from continuous employment without the need for the issuance of annual contracts. Contract professionals who are to be separated without cause from service with the University will continue to be given either six months' or three months' notice, depending upon their length of UA service. A significant difference from previous practice is that notice can occur at any time, rather than being dictated by the term of an annual contract. This rule change will be effective prior to the end of calendar year 2010.

2. Real Estate Purchases (Tab 2)

The administration requested authorization to finalize and execute project contract documents and to seek all necessary, additional approvals – subject to review and approval by the Offices of General Counsel, Capital Planning and Facilities Management, and President – to move forward with a public-private partnership agreement with Signet Development Group for the development of a residence hall in the Wheeler/Grant area for occupancy by August 2012.

APPENDIX B: REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

Dr. Proenza reported that, in reviewing the quantitative indicators, awards, news coverage, and community expressions of support and admiration for the University during the year that is coming to an end, 2010 may have been the best ever in the University's 140-year history. Certainly, he said, it has been the best year of accomplishments in his twelve-year tenure here. He added, "In the words of the AK-Rowdies, 'I believe that we have won!'"

He said he was referring to the College Cup victory by the Zips men's soccer team on December 12 in Santa Barbara that resulted in the University's first national championship in a current team sport. Reiterating Mrs. Brennan's earlier comments, he said that Head Coach Caleb Porter, his staff and the student-athletes have brought a major title to the University, to our community, to Northeast Ohio and to our state. He reported that the team readily acknowledged the wonderful support received and the energy derived from the community and the fans, hundreds of whom traveled to California to be part of the College Cup. Throughout the playoffs, Akron's winning goals were made in the net behind which the AK-Rowdies were stationed, a fact that one of the opposing coaches lamented on national television, Dr. Proenza said.

As an insight to what the Zips have accomplished, Dr. Proenza shared an excerpt of an article by Maria Burns for College Soccer News:

"The University of Akron's Men's Soccer team leaves Santa Barbara as more than national champions. They head home to Ohio a changed program. The Zips' 1-0 win over Louisville in the College Cup final at Harder Stadium marks the official end of Akron's steady climb to become a national powerhouse. History has shown us the road to the College Cup does not begin at the playoffs or the preseason or during the spring. That process is built on years of recruiting and experience. The teams that capture the College Cup rarely shock the soccer world. Instead the title ends up in the hands of a well-deserving team that's been knocking on the door for some time."

Dr. Proenza said that community engagement and support, strategic planning and diligent implementation have enabled your entire University to rise to a new level. As a result of national and global appointments and activities, The University of Akron's stature and visibility have increased significantly at regional, national and international levels, he said, adding that we need not look further back than the past few weeks for ample evidence.

He said that, in the days leading up to the College Cup, Trustees Pogue and York joined him in attending the annual meeting of the Council on Competitiveness. Dr. Proenza invited them to share their observations.

Mr. York commented that the University was well represented both in the formal program and in networking among the individuals in attendance. He said that it is clear that The University of Akron has gained a national reputation as a model for other urban universities in how to use the university system to improve the economic climate of a region.

APPENDIX B: REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT, Page 2

Mr. Pogue said that the Council is comprised of CEOs of major U.S. companies, college presidents and some labor leaders. He agreed with Mr. York's observation that The University of Akron is recognized prominently in this competitive field and said he hopes that a summary of the high points of that event can be circulated.

Dr. Proenza concurred and thanked Trustees Pogue and York. He said that he expects Northeast Ohio to have a special role in the work of the Council's current initiative, which is manufacturing competitiveness.

Dr. Proenza mentioned also that the University had been part of an invited group representing Northeast Ohio at the Brookings Global Metro Summit in Chicago. Once again, the University and Northeast Ohio were prominently featured among three other United States regions and four global regions relating to economic development, he said.

Both the Council on Competitiveness meeting and Brookings Global Metro Summit illustrate how your University increasingly is being seen as an exemplar institution for metropolitan, community and civic engagement, economic development and innovation, Dr. Proenza said.

He said that the amazing success that the University has enjoyed in this milestone year is possible only through the efforts of our talented team of faculty, students, support staff, leadership team, our constituents and collaborators, community supporters and, of course, the Board's fine and dedicated leadership, which he said he values deeply.

In closing, Dr. Proenza congratulated Vice Chair Ed Bittle for being named Executive of the Year by Rubber and Plastics Magazine and said it is very special to see his labors recognized nationally. Dr. Proenza thanked all of the Trustees, University colleagues and the community for benefitting our students in so many ways and wished all the happiest of holidays and a bountiful 2011.

APPENDIX C: FEATURED STUDENT BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Melanie Doychak is a senior Honors College student with majors in both Finance and Economics, and a 3.88 cumulative grade point average. Currently, she is completing an honors research project on the effect of the recession on luxury goods.

APPENDIX D: REPORT OF THE PROVOST

Dr. Sherman reported that there was an article recently in the Chronicle of Higher Education that clearly illustrated the limitations of the six-year graduation rate as a metric for success of colleges and universities. He said that the article highlighted some of the initiatives undertaken and perspectives adopted at The University of Akron to improve not only retention and graduation rates, but, most important, each student's Akron experience.

Dr. Sherman reminded Trustees of the University's objective to increase the number of full-time faculty in the classroom. He reported that he and his staff recently have interacted with the deans to develop their proposals to do that and to increase the University's research profile. He said he anticipated receiving the deans' proposals in the next week for his review with his staff and, in consultation with the deans and others, making decisions by the end of January.

Regarding Vision 2020, Dr. Sherman reported having reviewed emerging strategies associated with its goals and objectives with the Educational Policy/Student Affairs Committee. He said that the Office of Academic Affairs has been working to refine and simplify those strategies so that they are easier to understand, undertake and complete. Timelines are being developed, and responsible parties and necessary resources are being identified to ensure successful implementation. He said he is looking forward to interacting with the Board in the near future to finalize Vision 2020.

Dr. Sherman reported also having presented to the Educational Policy/Student Affairs Committee a college-readiness-based approach to providing wrap-around services for students with different college-readiness characteristics and, overlaying on that approach, a scholarship-distribution strategy that will link to possible enrollment strategies. He indicated that presentations on those initiatives to the Board would be forthcoming.

Dr. Sherman said that he has scheduled regular meetings with the executive committee of the AAUP to further develop and enhance that relationship, which the Board facilitated through the recent successful negotiations.

In conclusion, Dr. Sherman recognized the men's soccer team for their success. He said that, clearly, those individuals are exceptional students; certainly, they are outstanding athletes and coaches; but more importantly, they are true ambassadors for this University.

FY 2010-11 Priority Budget Issues November 2010

CURRENT

GENERAL FUND

- Revenues:

- Year-to-date student revenues exceed the fifth-month projections by \$3.7 million.
- Enrollment census data confirms undergraduate credit hour production 6% greater than for summer and fall of 2009, while graduate and law results are 1.2% greater and 4.7% less, respectively.
- To date, the State Share of Instruction (SSI) is in line with the budget and includes three months of the deferred FY10 component as well as the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act funds.
- The state has announced its intention to withhold 90% of the 12th payment, or \$7.2 million. This cash management strategy has been adopted by the Office of Budget and Management to ensure that the state ends the fiscal year with a balanced budget. This revenue shortfall will be overcome using the budget stabilization fund and vacancy savings dollars in excess of the planned \$3 million savings.

- Expenses:

- Through November, total faculty expenditures (including summer and part-time) are 4.7% greater than the same time last year, while administrative and staff expenses are up only 1.1%. Fringe benefit expenses exceed last year's by 4.1%.
- Scholarships, including graduate assistant fee remissions, are \$1.5 million (or 7.7%) greater than last November.
- The campus community continues to be mindful of the recommended fiscal restraint, as combined supply and travel expenses are less than last year's November numbers by 1.3%.
- November utility expenses are about 9.7% (or \$412,000) less than last year.

- Other:

- Senior administration continues to make fiscal decisions in support of the Institutional Strategic Plan. This focused spending will prove to be critical as we face the anticipated reductions from the state of Ohio.

FUTURE

FY12 Outlook

Planning discussions have begun for FY12. While we remain hopeful that higher education will not sustain significant cutbacks, we have developed various scenarios and continue to plan for cutbacks ranging anywhere from 5% to 25% of our current SSI allocations. Discussions about recent institutional commitments center on reallocation of existing funds, with the Institutional Strategic Plan as a guide. The priorities highlighted within the plan will provide the needed direction as we identify the sources or funds to be reallocated to address the obligations

The following purchases for more than \$150,000 are recommended for approval by the Board of Trustees at its meeting on January 19, 2011.

1. **Structural Actuators for the College of Engineering:** The College of Engineering is proposing the purchase of two structural testing actuators from MTS Systems Corporation in the total amount of \$171,044.
 - a) The MTS series 201 hydraulic actuator has a 300,000 lb. force generation capability at displacements of up to 10 in. It is a single ended, heavy duty fatigue rated force generator that may be used for quasi-static, fatigue or pseudo-dynamic structural testing applications. This particular actuator will be equipped with a load cell, dual servo-valves, end swivels for alignment and a temposonics displacement transducer. When coupled with our existing MTS controls system, full-scale structural tests and simulations will be possible. Examples include the testing of transformer vault covers, destructive testing of concrete slabs and beams using unique and new reinforcement, fatigue testing of luminaire poles, earthquake simulation and testing of structural framing systems for buildings and fatigue testing of trailer systems for highway vehicles. The 300 kip capacity with 10 in. of stroke allows the full-scale testing of specimens and articles and avoids problems associated with "scale."
 - b) The MTS 244 22 kip hydraulic actuator has a 22,000 lb. force generation capability at displacements of up to 10 in. It is a double-ended actuator that will primarily be used for fatigue or pseudo-dynamic structural testing applications. This particular actuator will be equipped with a load cell, dual swivels, a temposonics displacement transducer and a single servo-valve. When coupled with our existing MTS controls, the system is ideal for fatigue testing of flexible structural systems like sign structures, high mast poles and luminaires. The acquisition of this actuator will increase the capability of the College of Engineering Testing Laboratories by having fatigue test capabilities in the basement of ASEC on the dynamic test floor.

Primary application for this equipment is the structural testing of full-scale articles and components by the College of Engineering. Primary use of the equipment will be by faculty, and is for undergraduate and graduate research programs. Outside vendors typically have no access to use of equipment except indirectly as part of research programs. As part of research programs, there will be costs associated with performance of the contracts.

Not purchasing the equipment will lead to loss of research funding and opportunities for faculty within the College of Engineering as we have little capability for testing full-scale articles currently.

These structural actuators are classified as sole source and are therefore exempted from the required competitive bidding process.

Funding for these structural actuators will be from account numbers 2-07958 (\$130,000), Start-Up Funds – Menzemer and 2-07784, Start-Up Funds – A. Patnaik.

These structural actuators as supplied by MTS Systems Corporation are acceptable to the College of Engineering, the Office of General Counsel, and the Department of Purchasing.

I recommend that an award be made to MTS Systems Corporation in the amount of \$171,044 and request your approval and that of the Board of Trustees at its meeting on January 19, 2011.

2. **Glove-box with Thermal Deposition System:** The Department of Polymer Engineering is proposing the purchase of a glove-box with thermal deposition system from M. Braun, Inc. in the total amount of 175,509. This system will be located in Dr. Gong's lab, Olson 101B.

The glove-box with thermal deposition system is essential for the fabrication and characterization of "flexible" electronics. The glove-box with thermal deposition system will be highly beneficial for the research and education of the students in the field of plastic electronics. The students will be able to carry out innovative research in the areas of generation of renewable energy and low-cost flexible biochips. Research and education in the area of flexible electronics will attract graduate and even undergraduate students to The University of Akron. Local industries will utilize the facility for fabricating polymer electronics, since such a system is not readily available. Having the glove-box with thermal deposition system will enhance the funding opportunities significantly for the College of Polymer Science and Polymer Engineering. The College of Polymer Science and Polymer Engineering also plans to establish a Nano-Electronics Center. This system will be the key equipment for the fabrication of nano-electronics.

The funding for this purchase will come from account number 2-07956, Start-up Funds – Gong.

The glove-box with thermal deposition system is classified as sole source and is therefore exempted from the required competitive bidding process.

The glove-box with thermal deposition system is acceptable to the Department of Polymer Engineering, the Office of General Counsel, and the Department of Purchasing.

I recommend that an award be made to M. Braun, Inc. in the amount of \$175,509 and request your approval of the Board of Trustees at its meeting on January 19, 2011.

3. **Learning Management Software System:** The Department of Information Technology Services, Learning Technologies and Scholar/Learner Services is proposing the payment of \$174,300 to Desire2Learn Inc. of Kitchener-Waterloo, Ontario for a revised annual fee for use of the Learning Management Software provided by Desire2Learn as a result of an increase to the FTE count between 2007 and 2010. The original contract fee structure was based upon a projected 18,000 FTE per year. With increased enrollment and system use, however, the actual number of FTE has exceeded the projected FTE under the contract. To correct the number of FTE under the contract to reflect actual use, the parties have agreed to increase the number of FTE to 22,000 per year (as measured by the largest semester enrollment); because of the increased use, however, Desire2Learn also has agreed to reduce the charged rate under the contract to \$5.15 per FTE from the previously agreed upon rate of \$6.50 per FTE. The corrected FTE and reduced rate result in a revised annual fee of \$174,300, which will pay for system use through September 30, 2011. The original five year contract with Desire2Learn was approved by the Board of Trustees in September, 2007.

This learning management system is used by full and part-time faculty, students taking credit courses, and system administrators who manage the environment, track usage and maintain system efficiency. The learning management system is the primary method for delivery of all web-enhanced and web-based courseware. 1. Report of the Sr. Vice President, Provost and Chief Operating Officer

2. Presentation on the Strive Toward Excellence Program (STEP)

The presentation at the January Board of Trustees meeting will be on the Strive Toward Excellence Program (STEP). Vice President of Student Affairs, Dr. Charlie Fey will introduce Associate Vice President for Campus Life, Oletha Thompson, Director of Academic Achievement Programs, Coleen Curry, Coordinator of STEP, Deborah Stone and the STEP undergraduate students.

STEP is a unique college-prep program for first generation and income eligible middle school students. It is unique in that it is a true collaboration of business, higher education, public school education and federal funding. The Firestone Trust created a three million dollar endowment in 1988 to support an academic enrichment program for 7th and 8th grade students. These students transition into a high school program which is supported through the U.S. Department of Education's TRIO programs. Successful completion of six years of preparation is rewarded by a four year renewable academic scholarship to The University of Akron. The presentation will focus on data related to the success of this twenty-two year old program.

3. Approval of the proposed New Program in the College of Nursing

NU-10-002 Professional Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) Program Nursing

The College of Nursing at The University of Akron proposes to implement a professional nursing doctoral degree program that will move the advanced practice tracks and the advanced role track Nursing Administration in the master's degree program to the clinical doctoral level consistent with recommendations of the American Association of Colleges in Nursing. This proposal was developed in collaboration with Kent State University College of Nursing. Six of the courses are to be offered jointly. All other courses in the program will be offered at each university. Authorized by the Ohio Board of Nursing (Ohio Revised Code 4723-Nurse Practice Act), advanced practice nurse roles include certified clinical nurse specialists, certified nurse practitioners, certified nurse

anesthetists, and certified nurse midwives. Additionally, we will include Nursing Administration which prepares nurses for advanced management roles in nursing organizations. Both universities currently have large, high quality master's programs that lead to national certification and State Board credentialing of advanced practice nurses. In 2004, the American Association of Colleges in Nursing (AACN) established the position that all advanced practice master's degree programs were to transition to the doctoral level by 2015. On October 30, 2006, the AACN member institutions endorsed the Essentials of Doctoral Education for Advanced Practice Nursing (2006). Further, in 2008, the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE), the accrediting arm of AACN, approved the revised Standards for Accreditation of Baccalaureate and Graduate Degree Programs (2008), which now include DNP programs. These guidelines and standards, in combination with the Criteria for Evaluation of Nurse Practitioner Programs (National Task Force, 2008), were used to develop the proposed DNP program.

Faculty Senate has approved this new program and if you concur, I will place it on the agenda of the January 19, 2011 Board of Trustees meeting

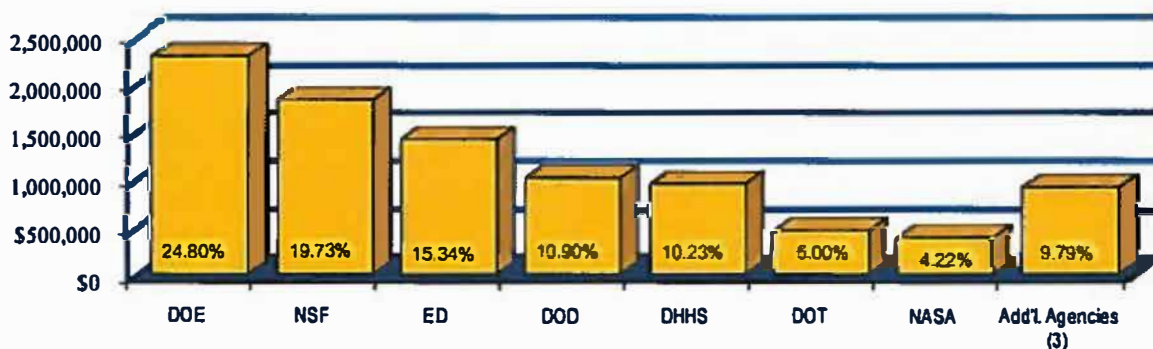

PeopleSoft Time and Labor is part of Oracle's PeopleSoft Enterprise Human Capital Management suite of applications.</p> <p>As of mid-November, the project team, led by HR/Payroll and assisted by ITS, was ready to launch the project, i.e., build a charter, scope statement, project plan, and identify resources. This phase should be completed by mid-December.</p> <p>A draft Request for Proposal (RFP) is being reviewed for improvements and modifications. Decisions are pending on the use of certain functionality within the module, i.e., labor distribution and leave reporting.</p> <p>The resolution of these issues will determine when the RFP can be posted for bids. Project structure continues to gain momentum with a project team outline and a charter initiated. Milestones and tasks for the project plan are being collected.</p> <p>We are currently researching the feasibility of putting in Absence Management in conjunction with Time and Labor. - IUC Benchmarking study

Along with other UA departments, ITS is participating in an Inter-University Council (IUC) benchmarking study.

In September 2010, IUC's Institutional Excellence and Shared Services (IESS) project was approved by the IUC Presidents Council. The IUC is conducting benchmarking surveys at all 14 IUC-member institutions, which includes the University of Akron (UA). A final report will be provided to the UA leadership on March 1, 2011.

This project is only an assessment of what services at IUC member institutions might share to achieve reduced costs and efficiencies. While it can inform decision-makers about how they might choose to proceed, it is only an assessment. Taken alone, this study will not be at the level of detail to enable an organization to redesign or make changes to the workforce.

UA anticipated the need for shared services several years ago and began building the UA/Lorain County Community College (LCCC) Shared Services proof-of-concept. We're hopeful that the platform we're building with LCCC can be the platform for Northeast Ohio shared services and, potentially, the entire state.


Shared Services consolidates operations in order to increase efficiencies and reduce costs. It is a service-focused model that can take many forms, anywhere from consolidating transactions within division or campus all the way to a standalone entity to serve portions or all of the University System of Ohio.

While there can be many advantages to moving quickly, Shared Services initiatives usually take years to complete. This means that reductions in personnel and other costs are primarily realized through attrition as employees naturally move on or retire. Resources realized in this process are reallocated to better support the core academic mission and other support services.

To evaluate the opportunities that Shared Services can provide, data must be collected to build the appropriate foundation from which to assess this business model. UA along with other IUC institutions is participating in the IUC state-wide study to benchmark administrative services. The project is being coordinated at UA by Nathan Mortimer.

ITS is preparing a training instance to provide as many training opportunities as possible for the campus community. Instructor led and self-paced training will be made available to ensure success in the migration.

This new version brings a modernized approach to the software in a true web-based model.

Additionally, this upgrade will provide the avenue into future improvements and application integration to better serve the needs of its users.

NolijWeb is currently in use by over 850 users across 108 departments containing nearly 800,000 documents.

The University of Akron is planning to retire the mainframe by June 2011. In order to do this, the data and in some cases, programs that are on this system will need to be removed or converted.

Currently, the project charter and project plan are being reviewed. Data retention policies are also being examined to make sure that a required data is retained according to policy.

The Enterprise Scheduling Solution Project continues to make progress. The implementation team has been running test academic course placements. As each placement is defined, significant time and effort has been expended validating data and ensuring correct system output. The framework for scheduling requests has been determined and testing has begun for entering Event Requests into the scheduling system. We expect the information provided by this new scheduling system will enable us to improve space utilization supporting our continuing growth without proportionate capital investments in new space.

Highlight

Residence Life and Housing

Campus Activities Magazine

- The Department of Residence Life and Housing was featured in the November/December 2010 issue of *Campus Activities Magazine* in a four-page article titled “Rock ‘N Road Show Rocks Akron.”

The Residence Hall Program Board won a contest sponsored by *Campus Activities Magazine* by submitting artist performance reports. As the winner we received four entertainers to perform within a two day period (a 9:09 show, a Rock the Roo show, and a Stage Door show). Magazine representatives came to campus to review the shows and featured Akron in the magazine. This marks the second time in the past year that UA has been featured in the magazine, the first time occurred when the University was named Campus of the Year. *Campus Activities Magazine* was founded in 1991 and serves colleges, universities, artists, and talent agencies nationwide. It is recognized as an important resource for campus entertainment and recognizes excellence in university programs.

MAP-Works Outreach


- MAP-Works is a comprehensive retention tool that integrates institutional and student provided information to determine the likelihood of retention. A MAP-Works fall transition survey was administered earlier this semester to first-year students. In November, a follow-up survey was administered to the same participants over a 3 week period. Data from the follow-up survey indicated Residence Life and Housing staff are making a difference in the lives of first-year students:
- Twenty-two resident assistants were personally identified by at least one participant as “The person on this campus who has helped you the most in your college success.”
- Seven residence life coordinators and graduate residence directors were

Examples of this include the Equestrian Club donating time for gift wrapping at malls during the holiday season and the Outdoor Adventure Club teaming up with the National Park Service to maintain the quality of the Cuyahoga National Park. All of the clubs are currently helping to make a difference through their contributions to the University's Habitat for Humanity project. Overall, the vision of the Club Sport Program to provide sport related activity extramurally while providing guidance to help students develop leadership skills and personal qualities that enhance the campus and surrounding community.

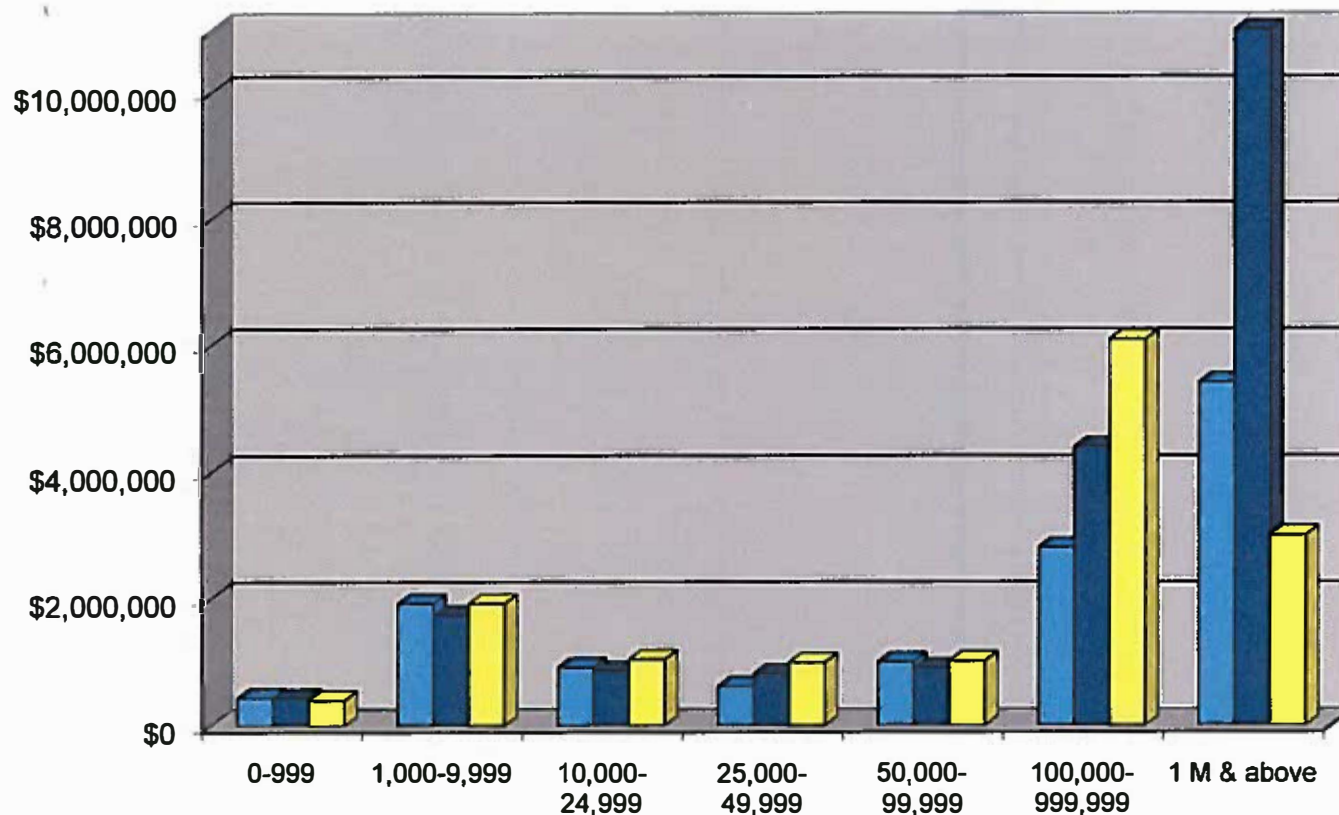

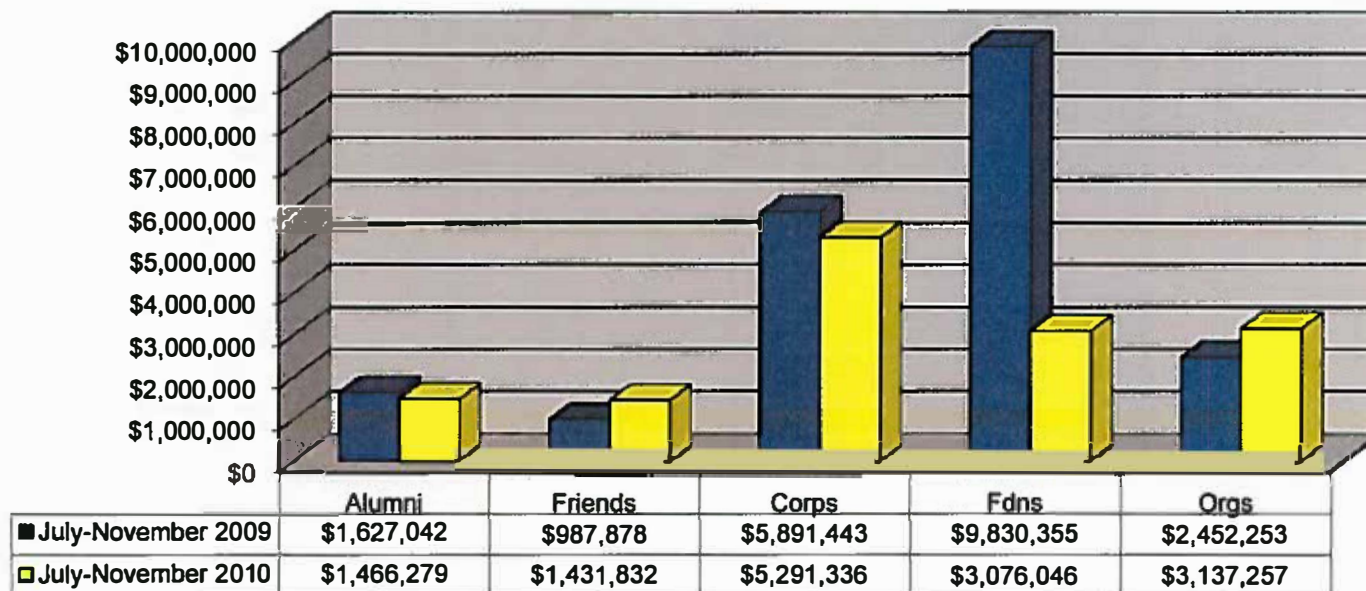

Comparison July 1 - November 30 --FY 2009-2010, FY 2010-2011**



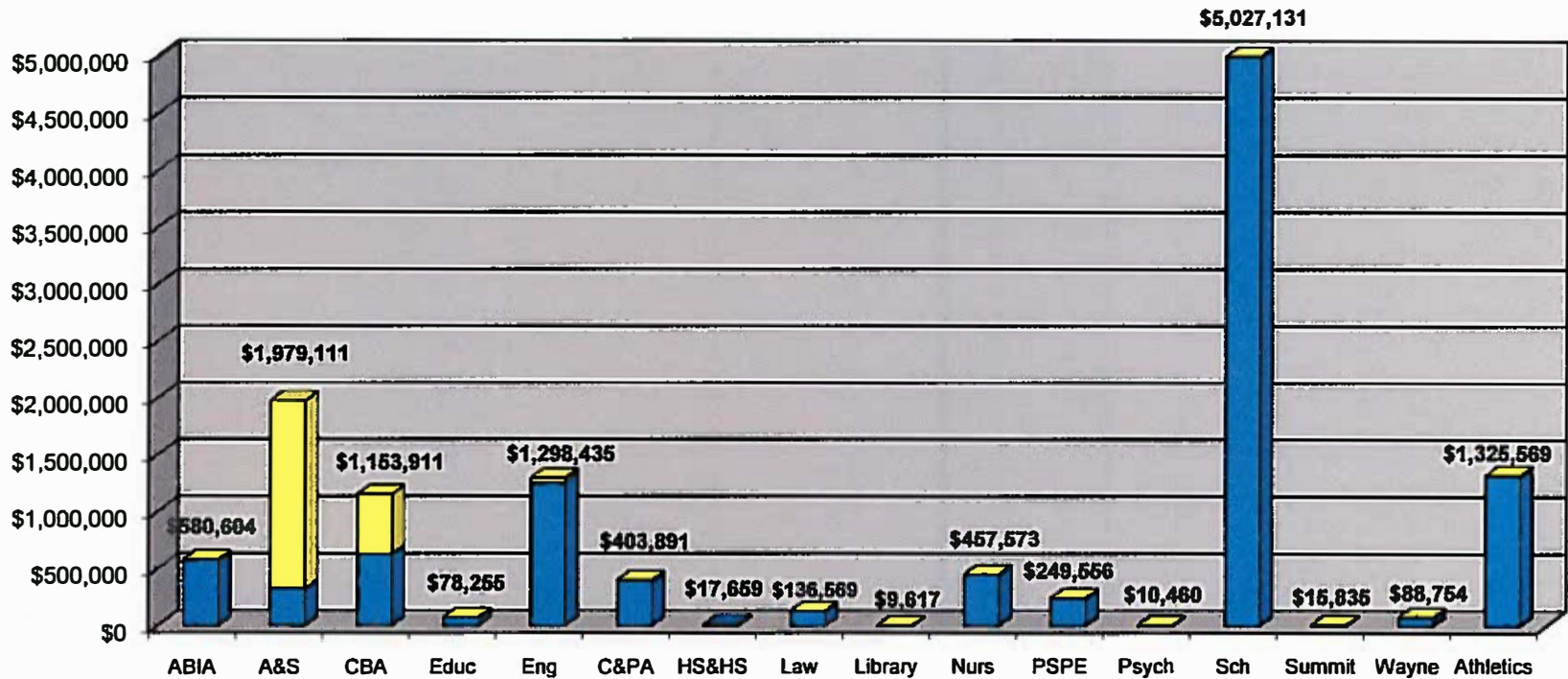

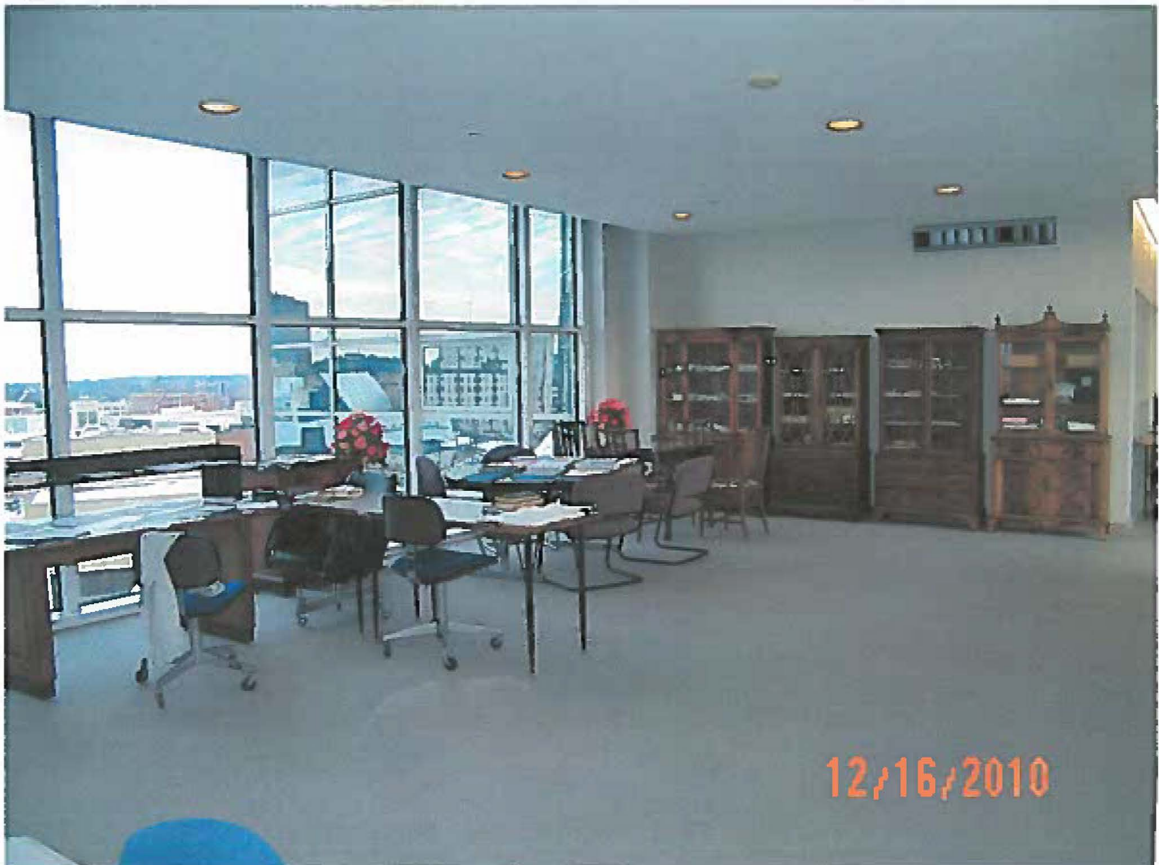

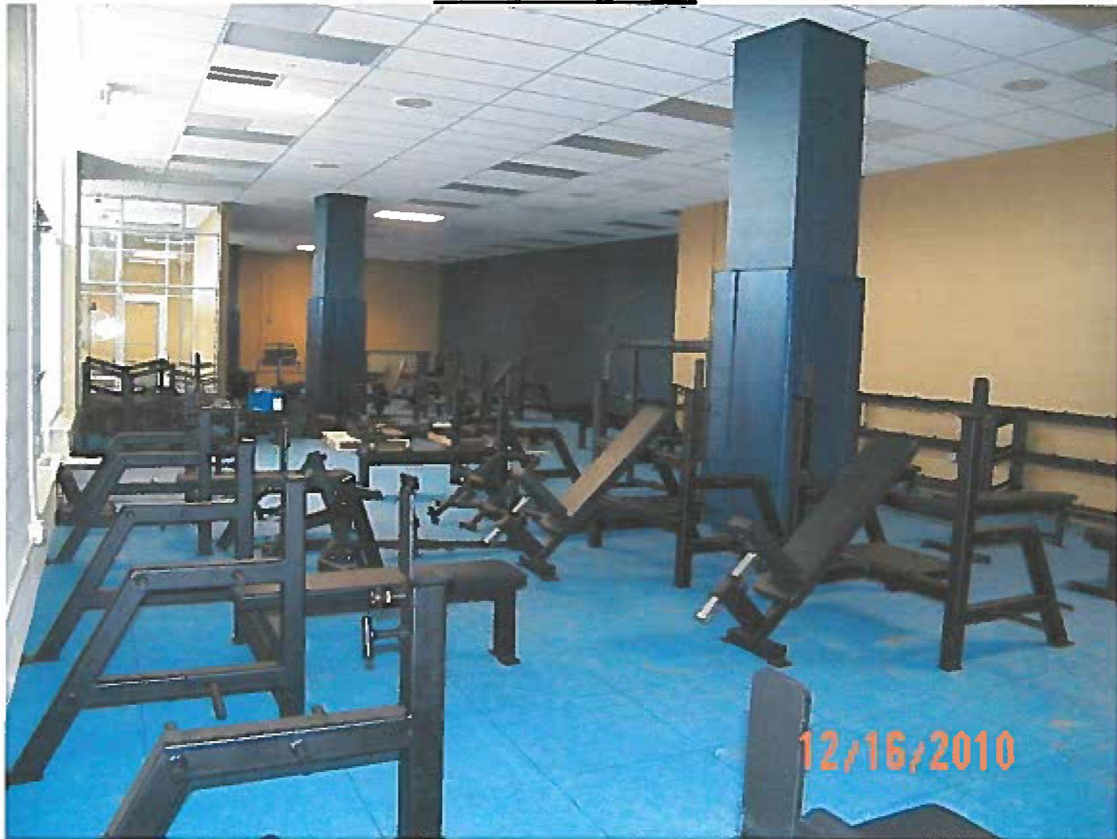

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that university leadership is expected to implement a new process of consultative decision making and shared leadership in Spring 2011, the structure and function of which will include a substantive role for the aforementioned constituent groups and their at-large campus representatives in the development of policies and in planning, recommendation and operationalization of campus-wide initiatives; and

BE IT RESOLVED that university leadership is expected to propose appropriate rule changes formalizing the structure and function of the new process, conforming existing processes with the new process, and including expectations that those in university leadership positions will actively engage with and utilize the new process to its fullest extent, to be considered by the Rules Committee of the Board of Trustees, and upon its favorable recommendation, to be considered by the full Board of Trustees as soon as practical following the proposal submission by university leadership.

Expression of Appreciation to the Zips Men's Soccer Team

WHEREAS, the 2010 Zips Men's Soccer Team advanced to the National Collegiate Athletic Association's College Cup for the second consecutive year and bested previously undefeated Louisville 1-0, thereby becoming the first team in the 140-year history of The University of Akron to earn an NCAA Division national championship, thus—realizing a five-year goal set by Head Coach Caleb Porter upon his arrival in Akron in 2006; establishing the program as an NCAA Division I soccer powerhouse; advancing the credibility and appreciation of collegiate soccer through an attractive, effective, attack-oriented and professional style of play; and bringing international acclaim to the University, community, region and state; and

WHEREAS, since 2006, the Zips have—compiled an enviable record of 90-13-10 with an 84.1 winning percentage overall (26-1-1, Mid-American Conference), including being 17-6-5 against Top-25 teams and 8-3-1 in NCAA tournament play; allowed more than one goal in only 12 of those 113 matches; achieved a Top 10 Ranking in 2007-2010; tied two NCAA records with 11 consecutive shutouts in 2009-2010 and with a home unbeaten streak that currently stands at 39 matches (38-0-1); and enabled 14 players to become professionals; and

WHEREAS, the program produced eight first-round picks in the Major League Soccer SuperDraft since 2009 (Steve Zakuani-2009, Teal Bunbury/Blair Gavin-2010), including a record five first-round selections in 2011 (Darlington Nagbe, Perry Kitchen, Zarek Valentin, Kofi Sarkodie, Michael Nanchoff) and a record seven total picks (with second-round choices Chris Korb and Anthony Ampaipitakwong); and advanced three finalists in three years for the Hermann Trophy, the National Soccer Coaches Association of America Division I Player of the Year award, including the winners in 2009 (Bunbury) and 2010 (Nagbe); and

WHEREAS, numerous additional accolades were earned individually and collectively during the 2010 season, including Associate Head Coach Jared Embick being named Collegiate Assistant Coach of the Year by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America; Ampaipitakwong winning the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award; two players earning All-America status; four players receiving Academic All-America, including Sarkodie being Academic All-America Player of the Year; and the team achieving a 3.5 grade point average; NOW, THEREFORE,
